

Student Success at Mason Student Retention Information for Faculty

The research on college student retention is clear: students need to build relationships with faculty and peers. These relationships contribute to a student's sense of belonging that promotes persistence. As faculty, you are in a position to challenge and support students. This engagement with students can make a difference in their academic success and their decision to persist.

Did you know....?

- 12.5% of Mason freshmen do not return for sophomore year.
- Mason surveys students using the Patriot Success early alert system in weeks 5 and 6 of fall semester.
- Last fall, 36% of surveyed students reported struggling in one class;
 17% reported struggling in two or more classes.

What can faculty do?

- 1. Engage students in their learning by using active learning pedagogies.
- 2. Connect course content to students' lives through discussion and assignments.
- 3. Set clear, high expectations for student performance and offer regular feedback.
- 4. Make time for students; invite students to meet with you if they are struggling or missing class.
- 5. Build on students' backgrounds and prior knowledge; invite diverse perspectives into the classroom.
- 6. Provide feedback on student progress when requested (e.g., mid-term grades in 100 and 200-level courses and progress reports on athletes, etc.).
- 7. Refer students to campus resources, as needed, such as the Writing Center, Counseling & Psychological Services, or Learning Services.
